#### ARLINGTON CEMETERY Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

On Jeopardy the other night, the final question was "How many steps does the guard take during his walk across the tomb of the Unknowns?" All three contestants missed it!

- 1. How many steps does the guard take during his walk across the tomb of the Unknowns and why? 21 steps: It alludes to the twenty-one gun salute which is the highest honor given any military or foreign dignitary.
- 2. How long does he hesitate after his about face to begin his return walk and why? 21 seconds for the same reason as answer number 1.
- 3. Why are his gloves wet? His gloves are moistened to prevent his losing his grip on the rifle.
- 4. Does he carry his rifle on the same shoulder all the time and, if not, why not? He carries the rifle on the shoulder away from the tomb. After his march across the path, he executes an about face and moves the rifle to the outside shoulder.
- 5. How often are the guards changed? Guard is changed every thirty minutes, twenty-four hours a day, and 365 days a year.
- 6. What are the physical traits of the guard limited to? For a person to apply for guard duty at the tomb he must be between 5' 10' and 6' 2' tall and his waist size cannot exceed 30".

They must commit 2 years of life to guard the tomb, live in a barracks under the tomb, and cannot drink any alcohol on or off duty for the rest of their lives. They cannot swear in public for the rest of their lives and cannot disgrace the uniform or the tomb in any way.

After two years, the guard is given a wreath pin that is worn on their lapel signifying they served as guard of the tomb. There are only 400 presently worn. The guard must obey these rules for the rest of their lives or give up the wreath pin.

The shoes are specially made with very thick soles to keep the heat and cold from their feet. There are metal heel plates that extend to the top of the shoe in order to make the loud click as they come to a halt.

There are no wrinkles, folds or lint on the uniform. Guards dress for duty in front of a full-length mirror. Every guard spends five hours a day getting his uniforms ready for guard duty.

The first six months of duty a guard cannot talk to anyone nor watch TV. All off duty time is spent studying the 175 notable people laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery. A guard must memorize who they are and where they are interred. Among the notables are: President Taft, Joe Lewis (the boxer), Medal of Honor winner Audie L. Murphy, the most decorated soldier of WWII and of Hollywood fame.

In 2003 as Hurricane Isabelle was approaching Washington, DC, our US Senate/House took 2 days off with anticipation of the storm. On the ABC evening news, it was reported that because of the dangers from the hurricane, the military members assigned the duty of guarding the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier were given permission to suspend the assignment. They respectfully declined the offer, "No way, Sir!" Soaked to the skin, marching in the pelting rain of a tropical storm, they said that guarding the Tomb was not just an assignment; it was the highest honor that can be afforded to a service person. The tomb has been patrolled continuously, 24/7, since 1930.

### CHARLIE HANNA, Parliamentarian



On December 7, 1941 Mr. and Mrs. Clark Hanna watched the Japanese bomb Hickam Field (Pearl Harbor) from their back porch in Hawaii. Clark was career Navy. Wilma Hanna was evacuated in May to return to the states specifically Denver, Colorado with little Carol (Charlie) Hanna inside until she was born in July.

After the war the family lived in Guam, Denver, Bremerton, Washington and San Diego. When the Korean War broke out Charlie and Mom returned to Denver when Clark was shipped out. At the end of each school year, Mom would pack the car and drive to wherever Dad was stationed for the summer returning to Denver when it was time for Charlie to go back to school.

After finishing high school, Charlie attended Long Beach City College and earned her AA degree. In 1963, she went to Dallas and enrolled in Flight Training School and was hired by American Airlines as a stewardess. Her twenty-first birthday was celebrated in New York.

From 1963 until she retired in 2003, Charlie was based in Los Angeles and flew domestic and international flights. Her work took her to Hawaii, Paris and London, but her vacations took her all over the world—Mexico, Europe, and Asia.

Charlie moved here in 1997 and always laughs when she hears people complain about the traffic here. She made many friends through her involvement in Eastern Star which led to extensive travel up and down California. In 2008, Charlie joined our Woman's Club and has held many positions in our club.

Charlie enjoys collecting pre 1940 cook books, cross stitch, needlepoint and is an avid reader. "This is such a lovely place to live."

#### SARA NEEDHAM


